

There's a day for everything, isn't there? Here's an unusual one to celebrate:

23 June is International Passwordless Day.

Bizarre, but true.

The date has been chosen because it's the birthday of computing pioneer Alan Turing. And it's designed to promote a change in how we access online services and IT systems from "traditional" passwords to more secure methods of authentication, such as facial recognition or passkeys.

If you're anything like me, the weight of all those passwords is becoming unbearable, so an alternative seems appealing. But lest you rush off and prepare the balloons and bunting, I should mention that this mostly is a bit of corporate puff from a tech firm that specialises in IT security. The idea is hardly original: for over 10 years, World Password Day, celebrated in early May, has promoted good password security, albeit somewhat fruitlessly.

Lots of us continue to use the same password for many sites, or even the classic password123 (so established that it's the name for one of the rounds in Richard Osman's House of Games). After several big-name retailers have been caught up in ransomware attacks, perhaps our attention has become more focused on our online security.

Increasingly our faces and fingerprints and even our irises take over from our creativity (or lack of): we are our own passwords. Yet while the role of biometric data is mostly about proving that we are who we say we are, there are concerns about the way this data is collected and stored. Concerns that the very features that mark our uniqueness may be exploited or used against us.

How different from the Bible's account of human distinctiveness, where we are each of us formed by a loving God, whose longing is for us to turn and know God in the way God knows us.

REMEMBERING JULIE BAILLIE









Julie's Thanksgiving

My husband and I were neighbours and friends with Julie since she and her family moved to Hinxton forty odd years ago.

My own family have so many happy memories of her. Our daughters attended Friday Club, made Easter gardens, decorated oranges for Christingle, dressed as angels in Nativity plays, brought their Guinea pigs to church for hilarious Pet services, collected money for the Children's Society and took their first steps towards learning how to play the piano under the energetic, cheerful and smiling guidance of Julie. Her achievements could fill a book; but today I would like to concentrate on two areas: Julie's love for her family, and her care and empathy for those suffering bereavement.

Julie was a loving mother to Jim, and a devoted wife to George, who she nursed diligently in the last years of his life. Her sister Cynthia was a constant source of happiness for her, and they had many wonderful holidays together. Cynthia and David's three daughters were favourites of Julie, and she would often entertain me with tales of the nieces. They returned her love, and when Cynthia was no longer well enough to visit Julie, Louise and Deborah were there regularly to brighten her days.

It is astonishing, but true, that as part of her role as a Licensed Lay Minister, Julie officiated at over three hundred funerals. I remember David Skeates, our local funeral director, confiding to me his admiration for Julie, that he was always so thankful to be told that she was taking a funeral, as he could be certain then that everything would be done with the utmost professionalism and attention to detail. Being there for so many families experiencing real sorrow took a lot from her, but Julie helped everyone with exemplary kindness, from the bottom of her generous and willing heart.

When my mother died, I too turned to Julie in my distress. She was there to comfort, support and guide us as a family, and delivered the funeral address beautifully. She officiated some years later at my father's funeral, and again at my uncle's service. Each time, nothing was too much trouble, and everything was done with such love and care. We were so grateful, and will always remember her kindness and compassion at such difficult times.

Caring, compassionate, courageous, cheerful, smiling, **lovely** Julie. It was a privilege to know her, and to be one of her many friends.




Victory in Europe - 80th Anniversary 8th of May 2025









A commemorative flag (now to be seen inside the church) was raised at 9 am, accompanied by an extract of Prime Minister Churchill's speech of 08 May 1945. At midday, the church clock bell was tolled eleven times (six years of war, four dead from the village and out of respect for the 'unknown soldier'), accompanied by an extract of King George VI's speech on that day. At 10 pm, the flag was lowered by an ex-Serviceman living in the village, accompanied by an extract from the 'declaration of surrender'.

. . . following the introduction of a number of bird boxes (large and small) last year, two kestrel boxes have now been positioned in the vicinity of the churchyard to encourage kestrels, one of which is known to roost on top of one of the church windows on the building's north side. Parts of the churchyard are now dedicated to supporting native grasses and wildflowers, a number of new native trees have been planted, and it is hoped to develop a 'damp' area to encourage appropriate flora and fauna later this year as well as swift boxes to encourage the return of the descendants of the swifts which used to nest under the gutters on the north side of the church.

ANN HOWSDEN CHARITY Call for Trustees – May 2025

The Charity of Ann Howsden was set up in 1631 when Ann Howsden, who is buried in the churchyard in Hinxton, bequeathed the income of her estate in Moggerhanger, Bedfordshire to benefit the 'poor and needy' of Hinxton. This land has all been sold and the current assets of the Charity include four bungalows (numbers 2, 4, 6 and 8 Duxford Road), three of which are let out at affordable rents to people with a strong association with Hinxton.

The Objectives of the Charity, which were updated and approved by the Charity Commission in 2020 are:

- The relief of persons resident in the Parish of Hinxton who are in need, hardship or distress.
- To benefit the residents of Hinxton by providing or assisting in the provision of facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life of the residents.

The Ann Howsden Charity constitution states that, in addition to the ex officio Trustee (the vicar), there should be 8 Trustees who are appointed for a (renewable) term of 4 years. The Charity is currently looking for potential Trustees to fill an immediate vacancy and another that is likely to arise towards the end of the year. There are no specific criteria other than being a resident of Hinxton who cares about the welfare and quality of life of all Hinxtonians and who will respect the privacy of beneficiaries. It is our aim to be able collectively to represent the interests of all villagers to help the Charity meet its Objectives and it is therefore valuable to have Trustees with diverse backgrounds, experience and skills. The current trustees are Andy Brown, Chloe Brown, Chris Elliott, Benoit Genevier, Jacqui Gruby, Jenny Goodwin and Ian Pearson. In addition to the Trustees, Alison King and Nicholas Cliffe facilitate the smooth running of the Charity as Secretary and Treasurer, respectively.

The requirements of being a Trustee need not be particularly onerous in terms of time commitment. Meetings are held in the evening on a quarterly basis, with additional meetings/email discussions to deal with any issue requiring immediate attention. Trustees divide up tasks (e.g. drafting and updating documents, liaison with agents for the rental properties, management of investments) between them on a voluntary basis according to their interests and experience. The Charity has developed and will continue to update policies and procedures to help meet the responsibilities laid out by the Charity Commission and will ensure that new Trustees are made familiar with these.

Parish Council Update

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting 12th May

Ceri Williams was elected as Chair and Sarah Robinson was elected as Vice Chair.

The documents for the Auditor were circulated and approved; these will now go for inspection.

<u>Wellcome Trust Campus Development</u>. The roadworks have been completed to date, although there may be more later. There is a new person in charge of the development who seems to be very amenable to co-operate with the village. The New Road junction has been test driven and it was agreed that there seems to be a fault with the design. It is hoped that it will be corrected soon.

Village Hall extension. The plans have now been received from the Moses's. They have been shown to the Village Hall Committee and some of the immediate neighbours. There are some updates to be made and they will then be available for everyone to look at and comment on. It is hoped that a presentation will be arranged at the Village Hall later. The cost with VAT is much higher than expected. Clerk will see if we can reclaim VAT and AB will also investigate this as it will make a big difference. A message has been received to see if there was anything that the village needed- ie the Mill. This would be passed on to Cambridge Past Present and Future as there is an urgent appeal for money to repair the brick bridge which will cost approx. £20,000.

<u>Playground</u> – report following inspection of playground. It is still saying that the Carousel is not the correct height despite having been installed by the company that supplied it. The trees over the climber need cutting back. Sarah to see about getting this done. The seesaw has now been fixed.

<u>Quiet Lanes.</u> Some responses have been received following the request in the Hinxton News for people to help. There were not many responses but thanks given to those who had helped. No definite conclusion can be drawn, mainly due to minimal data and seasonal variations. More people walking at lunchtime- probably from local businesses and the Campus. It was decided to continue the survey, contact local landowners and raise awareness of the intent to apply for Quiet Lane status.

<u>The War Memorial</u> has now been cleaned and the lettering reinstated. The railings have been straightened as much as possible, but they really need to be completely removed which means chipping them out of the concrete. Clerk to get a quote on this being done and raising the height of the corner posts and railings

<u>Village Litter pick</u>. This went very well with a good number of people attending. It was heartening that not much litter was collected, in part due to the volunteers who regularly pick up litter around the village and along the A1301. Thanks were expressed to those attending, the organisers and to Alex at the Red Lion for providing refreshments afterwards.

<u>Drainage problems in North End/High St.</u> This has been an ongoing problem for several years. Despite the drain being cleared, the water has nowhere to go and when there is heavy rain, the ditch overflows onto the property next to the ditch. This is a complicated issue as several different parties are involved. It was proposed that the Clerk will write a letter of support for the residents involved, with hopes that this will soon be sorted out as the time taken to resolve this is unacceptable

Thanks were given to Brad Charteris who does a splendid job keeping the website up to date and to the Clerk for her hard work.

Recipe Corner!

Asparagus tart

I found this recipe in a magazine years ago and have made it many times! It can be made as a large tart or 4 smaller ones. I usually add more cheese.

Hope you enjoy it if you get around to making it!

Serves 4

500g asparagus 50g cheese, finely grated

200g crème fraiche 1 tsp tarragon

2 large egg yolks pinch cayenne pepper

1 packet of ready rolled puff pastry

Heat the oven to 220 C (200C fan)

Snap the ends of the asparagus and discard.

Cook the asparagus for 3-4 mins until just tender.

Drain under cold running water and then pat dry.

In a bowl whisk the crème fraiche, grated cheese, egg yolks, tarragon, seasoning the mixture with salt and a pinch of cayenne pepper.

With a sharp knife score the pastry 1 cm from the edge, not quite cutting through it.

Place this on a non-stick baking tray and prick the centre several times with a fork.

Place the asparagus side by side over the pastry.

Spoon the crème fraiche mixture over the asparagus and brush the exposed pastry rim with a little milk.

Bake for 15 to 20 mins, until the pastry is golden and puffed.

Serve this as a starter or with salad as a main course.


