# Notes from the Editor

Greetings to my fellow Hinxtonians.

February is with us and instead of a Valentine-themed front cover, I decided to look for something different.

The Anglo-Saxons called February "Solmonath" (mud month) or sometimes "Kale-monath" (cabbage month), reflecting the practical realities of late winter rather than any particular mythology. February was generally seen as a harsh, transitional time—the dead of winter giving way to the first hints of spring.

February in the UK doesn't have a particularly rich mythology compared to some other months, but there are several folkloric traditions and associations worth noting, as well as St Valentine's Day.

Candlemas (February 2nd), is a Christian feast day marking the presentation of Jesus at the Temple which became layered with older folk beliefs. There's a weather prediction tradition similar to Groundhog Day: if Candlemas is sunny, winter will last longer; if it's cloudy, spring will come early. The old rhyme goes: "If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, winter will have another flight; If Candlemas Day be clouds and rain, winter is gone and will not come again."

Imbolc (February 1st), This ancient Celtic festival, celebrating the beginning of spring and associated with the goddess Brigid, was traditionally observed in Celtic regions including parts of Britain. Brigid was a goddess of fire, poetry, healing, and smithcraft and it is she who adorns the front cover this month.

May your February be filled with fire, poetry and tasty cabbage!

# CHURCH NEWS

## Portable magic

Stephen King has called books a uniquely portable magic. As a child I found that to be true: reading was a chance to live in another world and I simply consumed books. But there were many times as an adult when I struggled even to read a few pages. And I can often find myself easily distracted... If – like me- you read using an app on a phone or tablet, it doesn't take much to swap the book for checking emails or indulging in some pointless games.

This year has been adopted in the UK as a national year of reading. A way of encouraging everyone – young and old – to (re)discover the joy of getting lost in a book. There seems to be a kind of urgency about this. The latest National Literacy Survey found that only a third of children aged 8-18 enjoyed reading – a drop of 36% over the 20 years that The National Literacy Trust have been asking people. Amongst adults the figures are concerning, too: half of all adults in the UK don't read regularly, and 1 in 6 struggles to read at all, according to research done in 2024 by The Reading Agency. Moreover, over a third of us are what The Reading Agency calls lapsed readers – we used to read for fun and now we don't. And the reasons? Life events, health issues, and time spent on social media. I can relate to that. I stopped reading for pleasure entirely when my children were very small. I just couldn't concentrate.

But as a Christian reading is important to me. I belong to a people of the book – the Bible is a central text for us. I love the ancient practice of reflective reading... just focusing on a few paragraphs...reading the words slowly, over and over, more as if they are poetry than a story or theology. That's not to say I read nothing else: I still enjoy a crime novel... even when there isn't a vicar in the storyline or a murder in the cathedral.

If you are a lapsed reader and want to get back what you've lost, the advice from the Reading Agency is follow your heart. Begin with the things you enjoy – music, sport, sci fi – and take it from there. If you're into it, read into it.

## Notes from the Parish Council Meeting held Jan 12th 2026

### Wellcome Trust Campus Development

Hoardings have now been erected and advertisements will be put up soon. The Council had no objections but would monitor the adverts and ask Wellcome to ensure that they didn't become tatty and to remove anything not suitable. Details can be found in the recent planning application

### Village Hall extension.

The pre-application has been submitted and a response has been received from James Tipping at SCDC. This had several advisories and some inaccuracies in it; these will be addressed and a response sent. As soon as we hear back from them, we will present it to the village for their thoughts and approval. It may slow things down slightly but it is hoped that work will begin late spring/early summer.

### Highways.

LHI application. Clerk has applied again for a 20mph speed limit throughout the village

### River/weir report.

Cambridge Past Present and future now have enough funding to start work on the bridge, possibly starting in April.

### Community Liaison Group meeting with Wellcome on the 3rd Dec.

This was mainly concerned with the Energy Farm which will be built near to the A11; noise and light levels should be acceptable. This Farm will also act as an educational site and will invite children from local schools to visit.

### Hinxton News contribution from Wellcome.

A meeting was held with Wellcome to discuss the funding of the News Editor. It is hoped this will continue and we are awaiting their response. As this will also be distributed to the new residents at the Wellcome site, this will be beneficial to them as well. It was suggested that maybe the newsletter could be charged for eg Shelford's costs 50p, this will be put on the Agenda for discussion at the next meeting.

### Public participation time

Ivy overgrowing the fence in New Road junction; Clerk to contact Wellcome again.  
Cyclepath to Sawston- surface very slippery with leaves, grids are breaking with holes appearing, Clerk to contact Highways with photos supplied by Paul Breen.  
Potholes still a problem, especially in Shelford. Some repairs in the village starting to break up.

It was asked why the Village Hall pre-application would be discussed in the closed section- this was only because the Parish Council needed to look at it first; the outcome would be shared as soon as possible

### New items

Dog poo/litter bin south end of village? It had been brought to our attention that there was quite a bit of litter in Ickleton Road, especially near the level crossing. Could we install a bin for litter or maybe out up our spare dog poo bin? Hugh Taylor to arrange a meeting with litter pickers to see exactly where the problem lies and if we could put a bin up. Thanks were given to the team of litter pickers who do such a good job keeping the village clean

### Reverting to full meeting every 2 months, with Planning meeting if required in-between.

This was discussed but thought that at present we should keep to a monthly meeting, especially with the Village Hall extension plans still not finalised.

### Storage/ Community shed proposal.

Mike Boagey has been looking for a building in the area to open up a new Community Shed, like the one that he goes to in Saffron Walden. Several places have been suggested but nothing at present; however he has just heard that there may be something suitable in the village. This will be followed up. It would not be possible to put something up at the Village Hall due to planning restrictions. We will have a container to store tables, chairs etc once building is underway.

### Six free trees

It was agreed to order 6 whips, plant in the allotments for now until a suitable location is found. Clerk to place order.

# David Chater

1948 –2026

*This is a transcript of the eulogy read by Ed Chater at the funeral service on January 12th, 2026.*

"Thank you all for being here to celebrate the life of my father, David.

He was a devoted husband to Jane, proud father to John, Jennie and me, and an adored grandfather to Annabelle and Toby.

He was born in Cambridge in 1948 and the surrounding area was always home.

He met mum on the 15th May 1969 on a blind date. This obviously went well – diary entries from the time show that he took her to the Epping Air show around a week later – even returning to his diary with the comment 'fantastic day', though it is unclear whether it was the company or the aerial acrobatics that made it so.

He subsequently invited her to join him at a May ball in Cambridge. Jane Walker, as she was at the time, thought this was a wonderfully romantic gesture, delighted that dad was keen enough to have sorted a ticket with her name on it. It was years later that he admitted to mum that he had planned to go to the ball with his previous girlfriend who happened to also be called Jane Walker. He was delighted that he was still able to use the ticket

In any case, it obviously did the trick and led to an eight-year courtship, a timeline that mum brought up in each of the forty eight years of their marriage.

Dad became a chartered accountant with Chater & Myhill and then a Partner in 1975.

Ever the accountant, in 1976 Dad instigated a serious conversation with mum regarding the income tax system, and how there were efficiencies to be had with a few good decisions. It took Mum a few minutes to process that this was Dad's version of a marriage proposal.

It was during their engagement that the first signs of Dad's illness started to appear with bad back pain. In 1977, Mum and Dad were married but during their honeymoon in Tenerife, Mum was in the bed while Dad slept on the floor, a measure suggested by the doctor to ease his symptoms.

In 1981 the family moved to Great Chesterford, and it was here that great friendships were made and cemented.

In March 1990 Dad was diagnosed with Vasculitis, the Rheumatology consultant told Dad that if he returned to work he wouldn't see Christmas. This was a sentiment that made Dad reevaluate his life. He never returned to work.

After seventeen happy years of being in Great Chesterford, Dad's mobility declined and they decided to start a new chapter of their lives by moving to Devon. It was there that Dad went through significant life-changing, and in some instances, pioneering surgery that improved his quality of life. This included knee replacements, which offered the dual benefit of renewed levels of mobility, but also becoming taller than John once again.

During their time in Devon, both he and mum learnt a valuable lesson; that you can live in a beautiful place but without family and friends, it was meaningless. So, after four years, they moved back to this area, settling where we are today in Hinxton, building further lifelong friendships.

In 2003, he contracted sepsis, nearly losing those new knees, it was the first of many times that the family were called to Addenbrookes and told Dad may not survive.



In 2009, Mum and Dad had a holiday in South Africa where he fell head over heels in love with Cheetahs, hence today's chosen charity. It was the day after they returned, he suffered total heart failure. At this time, he was due to be at home alone but thanks to unbelievably fortunate circumstances, Mum, Jennie, Lee and I all were all at home when he collapsed. Lee carried out CPR for twenty minutes until the paramedics arrived. Dad was in an induced coma for a week and we were told that if did survive, he wouldn't

be the same man he was. However, it became clear that he was altogether more determined and stubborn than the doctors gave him credit for, and gradually he made an almost full recovery. It is thanks to Lee that Dad had sixteen years longer than he otherwise would have, he not only saved his life that day, but because he did CPR so effectively, he also preserved the man Dad was.

In these sixteen years, Dad saw all three of his children married and got to meet his two grandchildren, something I will always be grateful for. Dad continued to show this determination and stubbornness on many more occasions when the odds were stacked against him. Inevitably, dad's health issues became a defining feature in the latter part of his life, but there are many



He graduated to an MGB and later an MGB GT V8, various Mercedes and a Lotus Excel. Speaking of the Lotus – if mum didn't know how dad felt about cars already, she certainly did after she managed to crash it into the gatepost, cracking the fibreglass body work. Over the course of their marriage, this was the only time Dad stopped speaking to mum – barely saying a word to her for three days.

He passed his love of cars to all three of us children. Much to mum's irritation, this was Dad's topic of conversation with the doctor literally as I was being born, so for me it was somewhat inevitable. We will remember with great affection joyous times that were had at various Motor shows as well as events at Goodwood. This obviously didn't include mum who remains a Volvo lover.



other things that we will more fondly remember him for. Dad was a real petrol head. Although his first car was a Vauxhall Viva, he still managed to enjoy racing around the country roads. By all accounts, this was not always sober...

This love of cars even extended to his grandchildren, for whom dad embarked on 'Project Toylander', which was the purchase of a small electric Land Rover for them to drive around the garden in. It could be hairy at times but they loved it, especially on the few occasions where their Papa would be in the back. When Toby reversed into a tree, cracking the boot, the Lotus story came to mind, so we decided to hide it back in the garage and do a runner.


His constant work to research and improve the Toylander was reflective of his sometimes single-minded focus – this served him well through his health challenges but also manifested itself in other ways and interests, including but not limited to, Mouseman furniture, lawnmowers, croquet sets...and mobility scooters. Anything he wanted to buy he would research endlessly and 'inform' anyone nearby who would listen.

In his youth, Dad was very athletic and enjoyed all kinds of sports. He was a 400m runner for Cambridge-shire, enjoyed watching motor racing and loved skiing. But his real love was rugby, in earlier years he played every Saturday and even when he stopped playing, he never lost his love for the game, attending Twicken-ham when he could, which was nearly every weekend according to his diary! He was lucky enough to meet the England rugby squad in 2008.

He was also quite handy at bowling and frequently thrashed us kids. As his health declined, his competi-tiveness transferred to croquet and he would continue to show us how it's done, with mum's flowerbeds feel-ing the full impact as the competition and aggression increased. In his last game, as recently as summer 2024, he made it round the course only thanks to An-nabelle following him with his Zimmer frame. It was a lovely moment, and obviously should have been quite an easy win. As it happened, we drew (John lost).

He was an example of how to overcome adversity whilst keeping a sense of proportion. Rest in peace".*

In later years, his fortitude, bravery and continued determination were truly inspirational. Against all the pain brought by his disability, he would never complain. He frustrated us all when his response to being asked how he was, was always "oh, not too bad" or "a bit creaky" even when he was clearly suffering. On one such occasion a couple of years ago he had answered this in hospital when asked if he was OK, and fifteen minutes later we were told that he might not make it through the night!

Dad's death has left a huge gap in the family dynamic and I'm sure in his wider group of friends. His sound advice, his sense of humour and his courage in the face of adversity were truly awe inspiring.

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
